EASTER SURPRISES 2017

Spring is here, a time of surprises! The rhythm of life changes with the lengthening of days and the increasing hours of day light and warmth from the sun. For many of us this is a time of year bursting with *surprises*, as things long forgotten pop up in odd places of our gardens. The *surprise* of a pair of blue tits who laid some eggs and now have seven demanding mouths to feed.

April 9th is Palm Sunday, a day which recalls Jesus entering Jerusalem on a donkey with the crowds waving palm branches; Jesus at the height of his popularity and a day which marks the start of 'Holy Week'. But surprise! In only 5 short days the crowds had turned against him bringing us to Good Friday April 14th. Then Easter Day April 16th surprise! The resurrection of Jesus Christ is discovered by two women who didn't go to the Garden of Gethsemane to see if their Lord is risen – they'd gone to finish the act of burying him and, surprise, Surprise, find the rolled away, the tomb empty - the resurrection accomplished. Easter is definitely a season of *surprises* and also one of new beginnings. The first Easter can only have been a time of surprise and of bewildered, incredulous chaos as God turned disaster into triumph. 

COPYHOLD COTTAGE - A BIT OF HISTORY

As many of the readers will know the village of Kettleburgh comprises homes built at many different periods of time from very old to very new. Copyhold cottage is one of the older properties, dating from 1700. Originally 3 cottages each with a stable (still standing today) the 3 cottages were knocked together at some stage making one 5 bedroom home. It has frustrated me not to be able to find information of when the transformation of the property took place. Recent works I know were completed by the owners before us.

When we purchased the property in 2013 we decided to investigate why the name "Copyhold Cottage" was given to the property. It transpires that originally the cottages were provided to land workers who in return for providing a set amount of labour provided each year to the landowner at busy times (e.g. harvest time) could live in the cottage from year to year. Infact the property 'copyhold' could be passed from one family member or generation to another provided the labour was still provided as required by the landowner.

Today we are familiar with the term "freehold" when we buy a property or "leasehold" if we are renting, but nowadays it is not common to hear the term "copyhold". Indeed, I have not come across it before purchasing this property. So, if any readers have information on this subject such as when this practice ended, I would be very interested in hearing about it

THE LIFE OF A FARM LABOURER IN 1872

I recently came across a patronising letter written to The Times from "a gentleman" describing the life and habits of a typical farm labourer. I have abridged the 19th century, flowery, written word.

"As a man, he is usually strongly built often with a massive frame spoilt by the clumsiness of his walk and the want of grace in his movements. The labourer's muscle is that of the carthorse, lumbering and slow, caused by following the plough since early child hood. His food may have something to do with this as it consists chiefly of bread and cheese, with bacon twice or thrice a week, varied with onions which he often eats raw. He rarely has butcher's meat. Howeve, he does come into his own when the meat is supplied free at the harvest horkey or similar event, when the average labourer eats massive portions of roast beef or mutton. Huge amounts of boiled cabbage seem to be eaten and his cottage reeks with the smell. He seems to have no idea about using the onions to flavour his food or to make vegetable soups as his French counterparts would. He is much better clothed these days with corduroy trousers and slops, (a loosefitting tunic of coarse linen) taking the place of the smock frock. Everyone has his "Sunday suit" usually well made, and a hat. Women tried to copy their betters, often to the point of wearing kid gloves, which the writer thought was ludicrous as, the hands they were on had all week, been reaping or milking!

The author thought the cottages were so good they could hardly be improved! Most now had two bedrooms and a large enough garden to allow the family to be self-supporting in vegetables and a pig.I'm not sure the farm workers in question would agree with these comments and few had any personal possessions to stand on the mantle- piece or covers for the floor. The lovely, late, Peggy Cole told me the cottage she lived in as a girl in Kettleburgh, was so damp that bind weed grew up the wall inside!
