Deirdre's Leaving Party

Deirdre's final service as priest in charge of Orebeck held at Brandeston on Sunday 16th July with Deirdre herself presiding. With a little assistance from the large congregation the choir opened the proceedings with the introit 'Broken for me, broken for you'. Deirdre Parmenter gave the first reading from the section of Ephesians which talks mainly about Christ as head of the Church and how He confers on His followers' spiritual gifts to act in His name; Harry Edwards read the Beatitudes from the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew's Gospel. In his sermon Robin Alderson then tied these readings together using the theme of what we need to hear and looking forward to achieving our objectives. He then neatly linked all this in to Deirdre's approach to achieving her objectives in unifying the seven parishes in the benefice. The hymns, all chosen by Deirdre, were 'In Christ alone my hope is found'; 'It is a thing most wonderful'; 'God of grace and God of glory' and 'Lord, for the years'. The prayers were led by the Lay Elders. Finally, as a farewell the choir sang John Rutter's 'A Clare Benediction'. All in all, a very moving but, at the same time, a very joyous occasion.

After the service at Brandeston the congregation joined those at the Sunday Cafe in the Village Hall at Easton to say *au revoir* to Deirdre. Lord Marlesford reminded us of the evolution of, and Deirdre's contribution to, the formation of our Orebeck benefice. He thanked Deirdre, alluding to her previous careers and wishing her well in her next one after her official retirement. He presented her with vouchers and a cheque and she also received a bouquet of flowers. We all toasted her in Pimms and Deirdre thanked us and spoke of her conviction that God will be with us as we face the future together.

Our demonstrator for the evening was Adele Kent with "Well Heeled" as her title. The first arrangement was in a trug and in her garden clogs made to look like flowers just collected from the garden. She then told us the tale of an old lady who kept lots of shoes. They were in excellent condition and in the original boxes. The foot wear for the second arrangement were a bit of a puzzle and passed round the hall. They were ankle boots/shoes that were made from either Calf Hide, Seal, Mole or Deer skin. They were fur lined and at the time of purchase must have cost a fortune. The arrangement was done in a circular basket using orange Gerberas and roses with a selection of foliage. Two pairs of shoes accompanied the next design. A long basket with tall large Allium's and beautiful white stocks. The Allium's are a member of the onion family so the beautiful scent of the stocks masked that smell. However, the stocks are a member of the cabbage family so all the leaves were removed. Several other designs were soon taking up places on the stage, each accompanied by one or two pairs of shoes. Some of the shoes were modern but most were 1920/30s style. The arrangements were suitably matched in colour and mood. An excellent demonstration and an enjoyable evening, with a lovely insight into shoes. Members were invited to take photographs for their own use, and then to enjoy refreshments. After the raffle where some lucky members got to take home an arrangement. The evening's winners of the practice piece for the advanced section was Linda Fosker with Jan and Mandy sharing Beginners 1st place. The Single Bloom was won by Jenny Sheppard.

Thank you to all those who have brought suitable gifts with an approximate value of £1 for our stall at our November Open Meeting. Jan will be our chief wrapper again this year.

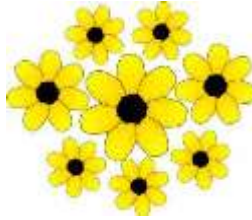

Brandeston Fete Report: Unusually, we didn't have any rain at all during this year's fete on 17 June - the one and only occasion since we moved to The Queen. However, a greater problem than rain threatened us: on Friday morning before the fete, we were told that the road would be closed all fete day for resurfacing but twenty minutes on the phone resulted in the work taking place from 5:50 am and being completed by 8:00 am on Saturday. This year's Fete was our biggest ever with a Beer Festival, Farmers' Market, Village Feast and outdoor dance planned for the day. The fete itself raised an amazing £5372 which was shared between the village hall and All Saints. The Farmers' Market had ten stalls and stallholders were reported to be pleased with attendance and sales. As soon as the fete was cleared away, 100 residents shared a two-course dinner in the open air prepared by the Queen followed by dancing to Matt and Friend - our own Matt Cobbold (and his friend!) until it went dark to complete a delightful summer's day.

We were also supported by our MP Dr Dan Poulter, his partner Sarah and our County Councillor Robin Vickery who spent several hours meeting all our stallholders. Many villagers across the generations took the opportunity to talk to them about issues they felt strongly about.

Lots of thanks to the large number of people who helped to make the fete a brilliant day out in Brandeston. Special thanks to Chris McArthur for his help with the planning and shifting of furniture, to Alexander Aitchison and the staff at The Queen for hosting the event and preparing the Feast and to Emily Mcveigh who liaised with us on behalf of the pub.

Undoubtedly, the best part of my week is coming home to Suffolk on a Thursday evening and leaving behind all of the stresses and pressures of a week in Parliament, not to mention the congestion of London behind. Returning home to Suffolk makes me really appreciate all that is special about this county – its rural character, great sense of community spirit and vibrant market towns. Indeed only a few weeks ago, I was delighted to come together with my fellow Parliamentary colleagues from Suffolk to celebrate the first ever Suffolk Day. Suffolk's thriving communities and great sense of spirit really are alive and well, with a great number of events taking place throughout the summer months. Only recently, I was delighted to visit Brandeston Fete, kindly hosted by the Brandeston Queen and supported also by Kenton Hall. It was wonderful to see the local community and visitors coming together, before enjoying the Village Feast later that evening. With such vibrant communities, a growing economy, and outstanding transport links, it's no wonder that so many major businesses and small rural start-ups are choosing to make Suffolk their home. However, I am becoming increasingly concerned about some of the inappropriately large planning applications that are being submitted to our local council planning committees. One of the reasons that so many of us choose to live in Suffolk is because of its rural heritage and our beautiful countryside, and whilst we would all agree that we need an appropriate level of small scale development and affordable homes to help support young families to continue to live and work in Suffolk, none of us wants to see our countryside destroyed by inappropriate over-development. Planning is, of course, a local matter decided by our local councils and when deciding planning policy, where there should be new businesses and homes, it's important that our local councils take an evidence based approach, and always prioritise brownfield sites over building on the countryside. That is why it is so important for our local councils to make sure they have a local development framework and land supply plan in place, to discourage inappropriate development. I will continue to work closely with our local councillors to ensure that we protect the rural nature and integrity of Suffolk's towns and villages and will always stand up for the best interests of local residents in fighting inappropriate planning applications.

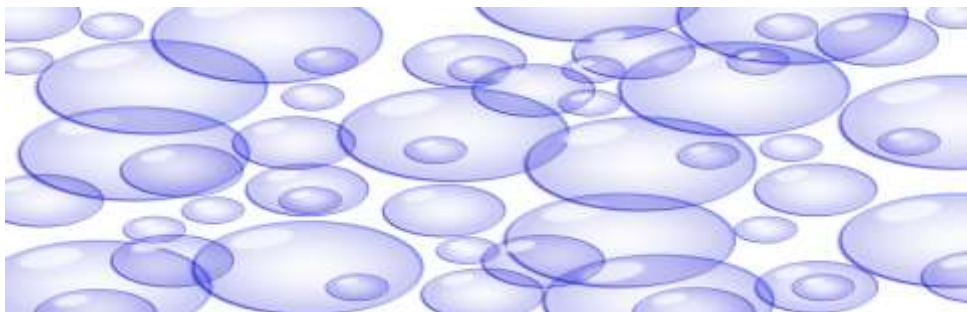

History Corner

An unusual Suffolk Emigrant

Alice Ivers was born in Sudbury on 17th Feb 1851, the daughter of a local schoolteacher. Well brought up, she developed into a likeable intelligent blonde young lady. being twelve years old when her family decided to emigrate to America. They settled in Richmond Virginia where father soon found a job as a teacher, staying until the end of the civil war when they moved to Denver, Colorado. In those days Denver was made up of mainly log cabins built around the silver mines and it was here that Alice met her first husband a mining engineer who was killed the next year in a mine collapse.

Alice looked round for a way to support herself, and, having watched her husband playing cards in a local saloon, persuaded the owner to teach her to become a dealer. This earned her the nickname of "Poker Alice" and she travelled many of the frontier towns following her new profession, She took to carrying a gun and smoking long black cigars giving her the appearance of a formidable woman who made a lot of money and spent most of it on spending sprees in the city. In 1892, she took a job in the Number Ten saloon owned by Bob Ford, the man who shot and killed the outlaw Jesse James while using the alias of Thomas Howard. She was dealing on the evening when he in turn was gunned down by Edward Kelley who used a double barrelled shotgun, and wanted to be known as "the man who killed the man who shot Jesse James." She moved on to Deadwood where one evening, a drunken miner attacked a fellow dealer named Tubbs, with a bowie knife. Alice, without hesitation, pulled her revolver and shot him in the arm. A bond must have formed between the two as they married soon after, retired from gambling and bought a farm near Sturgis, South Dakota where they adopted seven orphan children. In 1910 Tubbs died of pneumonia during a blizzard and fires had to be lit on the ground for four hours before they were able to dig a grave. She married again but soon separated and went back to the saloons opening her own near Fort Meade. This venture was well supported by the nearby troops. One night, after she had closed up, a group of drunken soldiers tried to force their way in and a frightened Alice, after shouting a warning, fired through the door killing one of their number. At her trial, she was found guilty but the kind hearted judge released her saying "I cannot find it in my heart to send a white haired old lady to the penitentiary". She died on the operating table after taking her final gamble in 1930. I obtained this information from a book entitled "Bowler Hats and Stetsons" by Colin Rickards without whose research the transformation of Alice Ivers to cigar smoking Poker Alice would probably have remained unknown in her native country.
